Cloggers add a modern twist

The dancers jamming at the Alachua County Fairgrounds on Saturday were cloggers, but this was definitely not your greatgrandpappy's version of the dance that tapped to life in Appalachia.

"You have to keep it young and fun," said a sweaty Kyle Kirkland, a workshop instructor, in between "Uptown Funk" and the "Swagger Jagger" that followed. "You have to evolve it to keep it alive."

To be sure, plenty of the traditional mountain music that spawned clogging was featured Saturday at the first-ever Florida Clogging Festival, which included workshops and competitions.

But it was clear from the dozens of dancers — gray-haired to elementary kids — on the floor for "All About That Bass" that contemporary clogging is a kick.

The festival was organized by Gainesville clogger Andy Howard, 35, who began dancing when he was 8. It drew more than 100 dancers on eight teams, plus the workshops to learn moves and routines.

"Gainesville and surrounding areas have a legacy of clogging. If it's in your blood, you have to boil it up," Howard said. "In order to go to nationals (competition), the teams have to qualify at a regional event, and Florida hasn't had a regional event in several years. This worked out really well for us."

Clogging shoes have heel and toe taps. Rhythm is generally kept with the heel tap on the music's downbeat. Standard heel movements and toe movements include steps, slides, taps and double taps, and foot drags and brush-es.Contemporary clogging adds hops, kicks, stomps and other moves.

For some cloggers, dancing is a family affair. Brittany Ferlita, 30, of Tampa, started clogging at age 4, following in the footsteps of her mom and grandmother.

On Saturday, Ferlita's 14-month-old daughter, Makenna, was competing for the first time in the freestyle category.

"My favorite is contemporary — the modern stuff. I like the footwork of it, the challenge," Ferlita said. "I went on tour for 10 years. I went on a nationwide tour my first year. Then I auditioned for a worldwide tour that traveled to Ireland, Switzerland, Taiwan. It was similar to Riverdance and was called Magic of the Dance. I showed them what clogging was, which was awesome."

Riverdance popularized Irish step dancing through tours and television shows — for years it was a PBS fundraising staple. Irish dance is similar to clogging, and Ferlita said most cloggers would love for their dance to rise in popularity to Riverdance heights. Among the teams competing on Saturday was Clogging Connection of Plant City, whose youth members wore black jackets and T-shirts with glittery lettering. Several of the kids also had stuffed animals, including one with taps on its feet.

As Vickie Edwards dutifully put shorts and a top on the stuffed animal of her daughter, Kendylle Edwards, she talked of how Kendylle dove into clogging a year ago at age 7 despite no one else in the family dancing.

BMC on the Road Again

Support Mars Hill clogging team's festival dreams

The Bailey Mountain Cloggers are such an institution at Mars Hill University that it's easy to wonder if the dance team wasn't named after a nearby ridge. But maybe that mountain was named after the cloggers.

Organized in 1974, the team has won the national championships for clogging teams 21 times, including the most recent title this fall.

And now the current team of 25 needs the community's help to travel thousands of miles away from its namesake.

The group is raising money to attend a trio of folk dance festivals in France, England and Greece in 2015. "We have been given an incredible opportunity," said Danielle Buice Plimpton, the team's manager. "We would be representing the United States amongst all of

these countries ... and we could potentially perform for thousands and thousands of people."


The Bailey Mountain Cloggers will host a silent auction and perform Dec. 6 at Moore Auditorium at Mars Hill University. They also are accepting donations through an online community funding campaign through Go Fund Me (Find more at <u>http://baileymountaincloggers.yolasite.com</u>).

The group needs to raise \$40,000 to pay for the student travel; the festival organizations will provide lodging and food once they make it to Europe. The performances would start in July and end in mid-August, Plimpton said. The cloggers collected local artist and business donations, as well as vacation packages for the silent auction, she added. "It would be quite the honor," senior dancer Paul Melville said of performing at the festivals. Melville, 29, hails from Florida, and traveled with a professional team before joining the Mars Hill University team. He took some time between high school and college to travel the world with a competitive clogging team, from Korea to Costa Rica. "There are only a handful of clogging teams that travel internationally," Melville said. "You really are cultural ambassadors," he added.

The Bailey Mountain Cloggers have performed throughout the United States and internationally in Canada, Mexico, England, Scotland, Austria and Ireland, to name a few. Plimpton traveled with the team when she was a student performer at Mars Hill from 2002-06. She's been the team's director since she graduated, she said. "What first reeled me in was the opportunity to dance and clog at a university on scholarship," she said. "You don't really hear about that often." She said the competitive clogging world has been "getting harder and harder" since her time as a student. "The performance level is getting higher and higher," Plimpton said.

The current team, with members from nine states, learned 15 new routines in about two months for the October national championship, for instance. "They work really hard and are super dedicated," she said. "They are like a family." Plimpton also praised the group's performance entertainment value. "That's number one," she said. "A clogging performance is very high-energy, full of personality," Plimpton noted. "It's kind of like tap dance, but a lot harder, louder and with a lot more energy." Melville described their performance style as more of like fireworks than a burning candle.

"Mars Hill is recruiting people from all over the place," he said. "They pull the best of the best." The group are great cloggers, he said, just part of the team's value — and one reason why their trip abroad should be supported. When the group traveled to England to perform, members reversed other team's negative expectations about Americans, he said. "We were one of the first teams to integrate (with the other teams)," he said. "The group was very social, thankful and appreciate. I had never seen that before. It was the coolest thing."





Cloggers on Parade!

Happy feet: Woodstock, GA cloggers to take part in Philadelphia Dunkin' Donuts parade (reprinted from the Cherokee Tribune Nov. 25, 2014)

Nearly two dozen cloggers from Woodstock will travel to Pennsylvania this week to perform in one of the oldest Thanksgiving Day parades in the country.

On Thursday, a group of 22 dancers from PowerTaps Clogging studio in Woodstock, GA will perform to Christmas music in the 6ABC Dunkin' Donuts Thanksgiving Day Parade in Philadelphia.

With cloggers ranging in age from 9 to 42, PowerTaps Clogging owner and Director Marci Rickard said this trip will be an excellent experience for the dancers.

"This opportunity is very special and unique," she said of the 1.4-mile parade, now celebrating its 95th year.

Included in the parade are giant balloons and floats, and performers of all kinds. Rickard said the cloggers from her group will perform to Christmas music on the steps of the Philadelphia Museum of Art, near the end of route.



Making the day even more special for the Woodstock performers, the cloggers were invited to appear on Good Morning America at about 7:30 a.m., Rickard said. The group will perform a short part of their clogging routine behind a correspondent reporting live from Philadelphia.

Everyone in the group has been practicing since September for the performance, Rickard said, adding the cloggers were "excited and honored."

The studio in downtown Woodstock has about 125 dancers, Rickard said.

Operating in Cherokee County for 11 years, the group competes and performs out of state regularly, the owner said.

The group was invited to participate in the Philadelphia parade after a producer saw the dancers last year performing at Walt Disney World, Rickard said.

Additionally, PowerTaps cloggers were invited to travel to London to perform in 2017, Rickard said, and the group is also looking forward to that.

PowerTaps cloggers are set to appear on Good Morning America between 7:20 and 7:40 a.m., and for those outside the Philadelphia viewing area, the parade will be online at www.6abc.com. The cloggers' performance is anticipated to be aired between 11:30 and 11:50 a.m.

"She likes the noise," Edwards said. "She loves to dance and she loves music. I don't know why she chose clogging. I don't have an answer, but I really think it's the noise."

Clogging is practiced in other countries. Among the participants Saturday was Nathan Ballard, of Brisbane, Australia. He has been traveling the U.S. for several months to learn more about clogging. He plans to share what he learns with Australian cloggers when he returns home.

"We've had clogging for 25 or 30 years. We still have a lot of dancers, but it's not really evolving," Ballard said. "The point of this trip was to see different ways that American cloggers orchestrate their competition and workshops. This is where it started."
